Thank you to all students who participated as well as Rachel Schooner, Jenny Snow and Jasmine Wells our Aboriginal Liason Workers for ensuring the success of this retreat.

On October 22nd, Hatzic staff and students participated in the *Drop Everything and Read Challenge* to promote the importance of reading. HMS had 514 staff and students simultaneously participate and read for 20 minutes. Thank you to Mrs. Johnston for overseeing this challenge and thank you to all participants.

As you may be aware, the purchase, possession and/or use of cannabis for recreational purposes will no longer be illegal.

Cannabis Legalization Effective October 2018



The federal <u>Cannabis Act</u> received Royal Assent on June 21. The Act will make it legal for adults to purchase, possess and grow certain amounts of cannabis in Canada effective October 17, 2018. The BC government's <u>Cannabis Control and Licensing Act</u> and <u>Cannabis</u> <u>Distribution Act</u> regulate how cannabis will be sold, distributed and

consumed in British Columbia once legalized. The legislation includes significant restrictions aimed at preventing access to cannabis by minors under age 19:

- Cannabis cannot be consumed in or on school property or within a prescribed distance.
- Cannabis cannot be smoked or vaped anywhere where tobacco smoking and vaping are prohibited, including a workplace, vehicle, playground or outdoor park, sports field, skate park, or other places where children commonly gather, near entry/exits, or at a bus stop. *Note: use of tobacco on school district property is prohibited.*
- Cannabis cannot be sold, supplied, or allowed to be consumed by minors, in addition to
 a variety of other measures to prohibit and prevent access of cannabis to minors.

While the legalization of Cannabis may be a progressive policy for Canada, it does not alter the School District's responsibility for providing a safe environment for students and employees. As such, purchasing, possessing or using cannabis on school district property is still not acceptable, in the same manner that possessing or using alcohol or tobacco on school district property is not acceptable. In addition, being under the influence of cannabis, alcohol, illegal drugs, or even prescription drugs can impair a worker or students ability to function safely; attending work or school while impaired is not acceptable.

Project of Heart

Last week our 'Project of Heart' was permanently placed above our cafeteria for all to view. This is our whole school project where Hatzic Middle School students and staff learned about the Canadian Residential School system and the impact on Indigenous peoples. The tiles on the hearts are our written messages to the **thousands of Indigenous children** who attended and died as a result of the residential school experience.

These students collect and sort all the recycle at our school which is a huge job considering our large school population. The students do all our recycling after school hours and on a voluntary basis. All money from the recycling is used to co-create an annual garden project and maintain our many gardens at Hatzic.
